### **ENVIRONMENTAL-STEM EDUCATION STUDENT PROGRAMS**

Whether they observed the tiniest creatures under microscopes, or used binoculars to view birds high in the sky, more people than ever participated in our TNAC programs.

# Trumbull and Greater Bridgeport metropolitan area elementary school students participated in our Environmental-STEM programs.

From taking a walk outside for our seasonal changes and weather program, to learning about beekeeping and pollination, Kindergartners and First Graders were introduced to E-STEM topics that they will build upon throughout their school years. Second Graders and Fourth Graders were immersed in environmental education as they became engineers by building beaver dams and exploring ways to save a city from rising flood waters.

# Grade 3 students explored Pond Ecology close-up in their classrooms and at TNAC.

The Horizon Foundation funded the development and implementation of this new program for Third Graders. Students were introduced to scientific inquiry using basic lab equipment and observing live creatures including a frog, turtle, and crayfish.

Generous donations from both the Horizon Foundation and the Henkel Corporation funded field trips for students from underserved communities to TNAC for a half day of nature fun and exploration during the heart of the summer break.

# A new Nature Exploration program was provided to Grade 1 students.

A grant by the Henkel Corporation allowed Bridgeport First Graders to explore the environment in their own schoolyards. Henkel employees assembled nature backpack kits during their "spread the love of science" volunteer day. The students used the kit supplies to make scientific observations of trees, plants, insects, birds, and the sky. They used critical thinking skills to make predictions about changes in seasonal growth.











### FAMILY AND SEASONAL PROGRAMS

# All year long, families came to TNAC to participate in our outdoor education programs. Highlights include:

### We play outside - even in winter!

We watched the sap flow from our 150-year-old sugar maple tree, then watched as the sap was boiled down into maple syrup. For St. Patrick's Day, families walked the snowy trails to find the colors of the rainbow, and all things Irish.

### Spring was busy with plenty of family programs.

Toddlers and their parents attended Tinkergarten weekly programs to play in the mud, and other developmentally appropriate activities. Our Earth Day program was replete with family activities, including a petting zoo, bucket truck lift provided by Bartlett Tree Experts, tree and seed planting, a craft, and the unveiling of the first of two "Trumbull Soars as One Murals" in collaboration with Trumbull student Danielle Haniph.

We launched our "TNAC Trail Tales" program series with the posting of pages from the book "Little

Mole Finds Hope" along our trails. Robin Bieber, MA, LMFT at the Mary J. Sherlach Counseling Center, and Melissa McGarry of TPAUD (Trumbull's Prevention Partnership) were on-hand with information about mental health coping techniques for families with young children. As late spring rolled around, we once again held our popular Fishing 101 and Intro to Archery programs.

# Summer brought out our Junior Environmental Scientists for more in-depth scientific inquiry.

Children discovered science and nature in TNAC's meadow, forest and outdoor classroom. They captured paw prints, made take-home aquatic ecosystems and more immersive activities along the trails and stream.

### In the fall, we harvested sunflower seeds, told ancient folk tales, learned how to backpack, made birdhouses and fragrant wreaths.

We grew mammoth sunflowers all summer long to be harvested by families in the fall. The birdhouses we made in November will be used by local families to feed birds all winter long.



















### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

### TNAC collaborated with its community in Trumbull and the Greater Bridgeport Region

We offered activities at Trumbull Day, the Trumbull Arts Festival, and Trumbull Parks & Rec's Paint-a-Pumpkin Event.

TNAC added to the fun of Trumbull festivities by hosting a tent and children's activity for local families.







# High School students were at the forefront of our growth in 2022.

Danielle Haniph, St. Joseph High School

When St. Joseph High School student Danielle Haniph approached us with an idea to bring our community together

with a collaborative project, we eagerly offered our support. Danielle came to our events where she had hundreds of children paint individual feathers. She then compiled the feathers to make a bird for her, "Trumbull Soars as One" murals. One bird was displayed in TNAC's kiosk, and the other in the Trumbull Library lobby display window.



### Aya Otorova, Trumbull High School

Trumbull High School student Aya Otorova passed a rigorous interview process to become the Patrons' student business intern. She tracks our grantfunded expenditures, filmed and edited a

video for our website, and has volunteered at our events. Aya has become a valuable part of the TNAC team.

#### **TNAC Goes Mobile**

This past year we packed up two of our most popular programs and took them on the road. We visited the Trumbull Senior Center, plus libraries and assisted living facilities in multiple towns.

TNAC is a member of the BYEC, an initiative of State Senator Marilyn Moore. The BYEC is committed to a holistic, threefold approach toward addressing the unmet needs of youth in Bridgeport.





### CORPORATE, FOUNDATION, AND STUDENT VOLUNTEER IMPACT

Through monetary donations and community action days, corporations and community partners have contributed to TNAC's success.



#### **Henkel Corporation**

A long-time supporter of TNAC, Henkel's 2021 grant funded our Grade One Nature Exploration program. Additionally, Henkel employees donated their time on 3 separate occasions in 2022. During their "Spread the Love of Science" day, they packed Nature Exploration kits that were used by Grade One students. They planted in the spring, and in the fall they painted our picnic tables, installed educational signage, and renovated our outdoor chalkboard.



#### Unilever

On a sunny October day, two teams of energetic Unilever employee volunteers prepared our gardens for the winter by weeding, mulching, and clearing our trails of overgrowth.

#### Goodwill of Western CT

Participants in Goodwill's vocational program came to TNAC again this year to help with operational tasks including assembly and maintenance projects.



### **Amazon and Community Volunteers**

In May, Amazon employees and community volunteers came to TNAC to plant and mulch our gardens. The flowers they planted bloomed beautifully throughout the spring and summer.



### Sacred Heart University Student Volunteers

This fall, students in Professor Pat Walker's HS 314, Intro to Epidemiology course learned about tick-borne diseases as they cleared our trails to mitigate transfer of ticks to humans.



#### Horizon Foundation

The \$15,000 grant donated to TNAC by the Horizon Foundation funded E-STEM programs for Bridgeport youth during the school year and in the summer.

# State of CT grants, donations, and earned income bolstered our organization in 2022.



These projects included a new street sign with interchangeable message boards, an overhaul and new fence for our butterfly garden, and re-organization of our building.




Income from our education programs increased this year due to broader outreach, including implementation of our mobile programs initiative.
