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ENVIRONMENTAL-STEM EDUCATION ENRICHMENT AT TNAC AND IN-SCHOOL







In 2023, we added new educational programs that extended our reach to older students.

With the addition of our Grade 5 Bioactive Terrarium in-school program, and our Ecosystem Field Study field trip, TNAC now offers programs for every elementary school grade, K - 5.

Highlights of the year's education programs include: Kindergartners from all six Trumbull elementary schools looked inside their classrooms' chicken eggs thanks to



Educator Mark Ceneri's expert candling technique.

First graders learned the many roles that bees play in their hive at our Beekeeping & Pollination program.

Second grade students from every Trumbull school came to TNAC on a

field trip for our Exploring the Environment program. They built beaver dams using mud and sticks, and watched as their constructions held-up (or didn't!) under the force of water. They learned the unique ways that seeds travel and designed their own clever seed models. Classes walked on our trails and played an interactive game to learn how plants and animals adapt to their surroundings.

Third graders explored plant and animal adaptations in our forest, meadow, and wetland habitats, and made their own creatures out of clay. When field trips weren't possible, we visited third grade classrooms with our Pond Ecology program, which brought the outdoors directly to students.

At our field trip for *fourth graders*, students compared a wide variety of plants, built mountains to withstand erosional forces, and saved our town from rising sea waters with hands-on manipulatives.

Thanks to a State of CT DECD grant, fifth graders built their own bioactive terrariums, complete with reproducing isopods, to learn how energy flows through ecosystems. Some of these students were visited by renowned children's book author/illustrator Lizzy Rockwell. Ms. Rockwell taught the students how to observe and draw their terrariums - an important scientific tool.

After-school and summer programs

To increase our outreach, TNAC developed and provided programs for *Bridgeport middle school students* and *Ansonia elementary school students*.

Thanks to a generous grant from the Kashulon Foundation, hundreds of Bridgeport students were provided with no-cost school-year and summer fun programs. *Trumbull High School students* were assistant instructors during the summer months, helping provide outdoor fun.

GROWING WITH TNAC!

When these two students were in third grade, they participated in our Pond Ecology program in their classroom. They peered through microscopes to investigate pond water, and observed a real-life crayfish, frog, and turtle.

Now as fifth graders, they visited TNAC on a field trip! They saw the pond for themselves, and walked through our stream during our Ecosystem Field Study activity. This continuity of learning helps build a foundation for environmental awareness and stewardship.



SEASONAL OUTDOOR PROGRAMS


WHERE FAMILIES AND CHILDREN LEARN AND CREATE TOGETHER

From spring through winter, TNAC offered a full year of programs for families to enjoy.

Maple sugaring and syrup tasting was on tap in February. Families watched our sugar maple tree being tapped and

gathered around our fire pit to observe the evaporation process while they tasted Connecticut maple syrup.

In March, we held our St. Patrick's Day Rainbow Search, where families walked






We had a busy month of April with our Hiking & Backpacking 101, TNAC Trail Tales, and Earth Day programs. Experienced hiker John Saccone taught hiking essentials; and Instructor Pam Roman read a book for small children along our trails.

In May and June, we hosted old favorites and new programs. Fishing 101 and Intro to Archery were joined by Make a Healthy Hummingbird Feeder and Build a Bat House.

Our new program, Bubbles in Nature, had children making their own colorful bubble art as they learned about naturally occurring bubbles from spittlebugs to flowing lava.


Storytelling & S'mores and our

LEARNING E-STEM ON THE TNAC TRAILS

Families headed out onto the trails to perform environmental experiments and enjoy nature along the way.

Before they headed out on their adventures, families checked-in at the Trail Station where they were given a custom map, guidebook, and science tool kit. They used these supplies as they navigated their way to ten marked trail stops.

At each trail stop, families performed an experiment or activity that had them learning a unique Environmental-STEM concept. These included a visit to a human sundial where they determined the time of day by using their shadows, a hydropower generating station where they used the force of water to light a bulb, and a water experiment where they plunged a thermometer into the pond to compare their reading to the air temperature. These are just a few of the stops along the trail that immersed adults and kids alike in Environmental STEM learning.

Multi-generational families have participated in the program, spending quality time outdoors, while sharing in a fun E-STEM learning experience.


Green Village Initiative Harvest Festival

TNAC was honored to support Danielle Haniph's "Connecticut Kaleidoscope" banner.

An initiative of CT State Senator Marilyn Moore, St. Joseph's High School 2023 alum Danielle Haniph developed this community-building banner with administrative and grantfunded financial support from TNAC.

The banner displayed over 400 butterflies painted by Trumbull, Bridgeport, and Monroe second grade students. It was displayed in libraries in all three communities, as well as the CT State Capitol, where Sen. Moore recognized Danielle and TNAC on the floor of the Senate for this outstanding achievement.

HENKEL AND UNILEVER COMMUNITY IMPACT DAYS

These multi-year partners have helped make a huge impact on TNAC's appearance and functionality.

Henkel Corporation

Volunteers from our corporate neighbors completed multiple projects inside the building and on the grounds, in both the spring and the fall.

In the spring, they sanded and re-painted our sign, raked, shoveled and cleared our trails. In the fall, 20 hard-working employees overhauled the area in front of our new ramp, including planting native winterberry bushes. They repaired the playground wall, loosened stuck doors, fixed wheelbarrows, and posted book pages along our trails.

In addition to all of this work, the Henkel Corporation recently awarded TNAC a \$10,000 grant for a new Sustainable Youth program and a continuation of our Science Adventure Trail Student Docent program.

FINANCIAL REPORT/PARTICIPATION RATE

TWO YEARS OF STATE FUNDING = INCREASED PARTICIPATION

Record-breaking number of total participants.

In 2023, we provided programs to 5,225 participants. This was a 10% increase in participation over 2022. Educational program participation showed the highest growth at 4,184 vs. 2022's 3,671. This is largely due to our increased visits to multiple schools in both Bridgeport and Trumbull.

We also increased our participation from students in neighboring towns including Newtown, Ansonia, and Monroe.


Our largest grants and donations came from a variety of generous donors.






A portion of 2023 expenses were paid for using grant income received in 2022.

In 2023, our expenses exceeded income because of grants received in 2022 that covered 2023. This included both the second year of a biennial \$75,000 State of CT Department of Economic & Community Development grant and a one year \$35,000 grant for Youth Services Prevention from the State of CT Judicial Department.

BUILDING TOWARDS THE FUTURE

ARPA FUNDED PROJECTS AND PLANNING AHEAD

The Patrons of TNAC thank the Town of Trumbull for allocating American Rescue Plan funds towards TNAC building improvements.

The Town of Trumbull allocated \$75,000 in 2023 for much needed projects. These included the replacement and widening of the ADA accessible ramp to the front door, replacement of the roof and partial new gutters, four new exterior doors and new basement garage door. These repairs have helped improve our visitors' experience.

Looking back on 2023, we are grateful to our donors, volunteers, and program participants.

Donations allowed hundreds of students from underserved communities to participate in our programs. The feedback we get from these children's teachers can be summarized in the picture at right.
